DESCRIPTION

Notre cours tracera l'évolution de la langue française à partir de ses racines latines jusqu'à la langue moderne. On essaiera de situer les changements linguistiques observés dans nos textes dans leur contexte historique et social. Le thème principal qui guidera nos efforts est la question, "Comment un ensemble de dialectes devient-il une langue standard, standardisée?" Un choix de textes variés (lettres, testaments, extraits bibliques, contes, littérature classique, conseils ménagers, écriture journalistique entre autres) révélera la grande richesse de mots et de moyens linguistiques que possède la langue française à toute époque. Lecture et discussion, travaux pratiques.

Objectives

- (1) pouvoir décrire, dans les termes de la discipline, l'évolution du français du point de vue linguistique d'une part et du point de vue sociopolitique d'autre part
- (2) comprendre les mécanismes de changement linguistique et le déroulement typique de la standardisation de langue
- (3) maîtriser les techniques d'analyse linguistique de textes anciens et savoir reconnaître dans ces textes des indications de variation et de changement
- (4) mieux apprécier la systématicité de la langue française (même des anomalies apparentes!)

- Late assignments and missed tests policy :

Tests: There is no possibility of a make-up midterm test. At the instructor's discretion, students who miss the test

may have the weighting normally assigned to the midterm transferred to the final examination if they produce a valid excuse supported by appropriate documentation. Valid excuses are illness, marriage, childbirth, and domestic affliction. Unexcused absence will result in a mark of zero.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
