DESCRIPTION

Le cours comportera deux aspects. L'un, plus théorique, portera sur la relation entre la culture et la mentalité françaises et la recherche de la précision dans l'expression écrite. L'autre, plus pratique, consistera à comprendre comment écrire et à apprendre à écrire en contexte universitaire : théorie et pratique des différents types de textes, composantes du texte, méthodologies, construire un raisonnement logique à partir d'un plan, production de textes raisonnés et réfléchis.

COURSE NOTES

Format du cours : Le cours consistera en une combinaison de cours magistraux et d'exercices en classe individuels et en groupes. L'accent sera mis sur la pratique de la rédaction de textes raisonnés et réfléchis.

Late assignments and missed tests policy: No late assignments will be accepted unless prior arrangements have been made with the professor and valid justification has been provided (medical certificate, proof of earthquake, etc.). This course includes regular in-class tests. Students will not be able to write missed tests at

other dates and times than the prescribed set dates and times unless request is made in writing and valid justification is provided.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

DISABILITIES AND ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATION

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations.
