DESCRIPTION :

Ce cours se veut une étude approfondie des conditions historiques socio-économiques, culturelles, institutionnelles et linguistiques qui structurent la vie culturelle et littéraire du Canada francophone. Le cours s'articulera de manière à tracer un parallèle constant avec les pratiques du même type au Québec pour bien marquer la différence des deux groupes (minorisé et majoritaire).

OBJECTIVES :

- Réfléchir aux conditions de production culturelles et littéraires des groupes minorisés;
- Réfléchir aux dynamiques structurantes du champ culturel puis du champ littéraire;
- Découvrir un vaste corpus de productions culturelles et littéraires;
- Considérer la diversité du corpus en fonction des enjeux culturels, discursifs, esthétiques, formels, idéologiques et politiques qu'elle soulève;
- Se familiariser avec les grandes problématiques de l'écriture en situation minoritaire; • Identifier certains traits caractéristiques et thèmes des pratiques franco-canadiennes;
- Perfectionner l'expression orale et écrite en français.

SKILLS REQUIRED :

- Très bonne connaissance du français écrit et parlé. • Très bonne connaissance des bases de l'analyse littéraire.
- Connaissance de certaines perspectives théoriques en études littéraires (histoire littéraire, sociocritique, sociologie de la littérature, analyse du discours et rhétorique).
- Connaissance avancée de la méthodologie de recherche en études littéraires

OUTCOMES :

- À la fin du trimestre, les étudiant.es seront en mesure de reconnaître les particularités l'histoire et de la culture franco-canadienne.
- Ils et elles auront une meilleure connaissance du corpus littéraire franco-canadien.
- Ils et elles seront en mesure d'analyser un texte ou un corpus dans la perspective des études littéraires.

Academic misconduct

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
 - a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
 - b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
 - c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
 - d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY AND COPYRIGHT LEGISLATION

Course materials created by instructors (including presentations and posted notes, labs, case studies, assignments and exams) remain the intellectual property of the instructor. These materials may not be reproduced, redistributed or copied without the explicit consent of the instructor.
