DESCRIPTION Introduction à la littérature du XVIII^e siècle. Discussion des idées développées par les penseurs des Lumières. Rôle du roman, de la philosophie et de la peinture dans ce théâtre intellectuel.

Objectifs : Faire la connaissance des quelques-uns des grands penseurs des Lumières françaises (Diderot, Voltaire, Rousseau) et de quelques peintres (Fragonard, La Tour, Robert, Greuze). Apprendre à analyser de manière critique les idées promues par la pensée des Lumières. Étudier les liens entre les cultures visuelle et écrite de cette époque. Améliorer le français écrit des étudiants.

Prerequis : French 317 ou 329 plus 339 et un autre cours de français de niveau 300 (de préférence le 353), ou autorisation du Département.

DISTRIBUTION des NOTES

- (1) Travail préliminaire = 16% de la note finale
- (2) résumés écrits concernant la séance précédente (4 x 6% - chaque résumé comportera à peu près 400 mots) – Une partie de la note attribuée pour chaque résumé (25%) sera réservée à la grammaire et à l'orthographe) TOTAL pour les résumés = 24% de la note finale
- (3) participation active en classe (ce qui comprendra, entre autres, des résumés oraux de chacune des séances et des réponses orales aux questions posées durant chacune des séances) = 16% de la note finale
- (4) présentation orale - la présentation orale (à la toute fin du cours) concernera un livre au programme. Le sujet précis sera choisi par les étudiants en consultation avec le professeur durant le mois de septembre = 14% de la note finale
- (5) travail écrit – le travail écrit sera une version détaillée (et surtout améliorée) de la présentation orale (9 pages tapuscrites [double interligne] + bibliographie + notes) = 30% de la note finale

Il n'y aura pas d'examen final.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
