DESCRIPTION

Ce cours comporte deux volets principaux. D'une part, nous étudierons trois temps forts de l'histoire de la prose narrative française du XIX^e siècle : un examen détaillé du roman *Le Père Goriot*, d'Honoré de Balzac, nous permettra, dans un premier temps, d'examiner les enjeux du romantisme romanesque tout en nous initiant aux fondements théoriques qui façonnèrent la tradition réaliste moderne ; une étude du roman *La Dame aux Camélias*, d'Alexandre Dumas fils, nous permettra ensuite d'explorer les enjeux du mouvement réaliste qui consacra le genre romanesque au milieu du siècle puisque, pour la première fois, des romanciers (et non des poètes ou des dramaturges) s'unissaient pour défendre une esthétique littéraire et faire école ; enfin, une lecture de *L'Assommoir*, d'Émile Zola, nous permettra d'interroger les principes positivistes et, paradoxalement, stylistiques, à l'œuvre dans le « roman expérimental » de Zola, chef de file du Naturalisme. D'autre part, parallèlement à la lecture de ces quatre classiques, nous réviserons, étudierons et mettrons en pratique les principes de base du compte-rendu et de la recherche littéraires.

OBJECTIVES

- Faire lire et connaître trois classiques de la prose narrative française du XIX^e siècle
- Faire découvrir quatre poétiques romanesques et narratives
- Faire faire des comparaisons entre ces styles
- Montrer une coupe diachronique du réalisme romanesque
- Développer les aptitudes pour l'analyse littéraire

OUTCOMES

Au sortir de ce cours, l'étudiant.e aura élargi sa compréhension historique du siècle numéro 19, saura distinguer certains aspects importants qui caractérisent l'évolution de la prose romanesque française entre la période postrévolutionnaire et les débuts de la 3^e République et sera préparé à entreprendre des travaux plus ambitieux dans les cours de littérature du niveau 500.

COURSE NOTES

1. All pedagogical activities will be delivered in a synchronous mode, via Zoom / D2L during the scheduled course hours, Tu/Th from 12:30 to 13:45 am.
2. Three (3) of the six (6) assessments, the three "Tests de Lecture", will be completed online during a 24-hour window. One (1) assessment, the "Oral Research Presentation", will be done during scheduled class time (students will have to schedule their presentation in one of the four courses dedicated to this assessment, see calendar below for the exact dates). Lastly, the other two assignments, the "Compte-rendu" and the "Travail final", will be done at home during the student's own time and deposited in a "Drop-Box" on the D2L's course platform.

4. Guidelines for submitting assignments: the scheduled writing assignment, the final paper, will be submitted in a designated Dropbox on the course's D2L site. Please see **Assessment** section here below.
5. Policy in case of missed or late assignments: une déduction de 10% par jour de retard sera appliquée aux travaux remis après la prévue pour la remise ; un examen ou un travail ne pourra être repris qu'en cas d'un empêchement justifié par une raison d'ordre médical ou par une raison sérieuse et importante qui devra faire l'objet d'une discussion avec le professeur, dans le respect des règles disciplinaires en cours à l'Université de Calgary.
6. Attendance and participation: attendance at ALL on-line classes and assignments is expected.
7. Online "Zoom" Class Etiquette: A) on your Zoom screen/profile, please use your real name and the name by which you would like to be addressed by the prof and by others during class; you may add your preferred pronouns in brackets if you wish and a pronunciation helper if you deem it necessary. B) Be



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mindful of your "on-camera" space; you may curate that space in advance and organize the setting/decor that will be made visible on camera; you may also choose to use a virtual backdrop if you do not wish your living space to be visible to others. C) Avoid distraction while online: for instance, before class, clear the room of playful pets, try to minimize background noise by turning off the TV and radio, and, please, also turn off and set aside your cell phone just like you would if you were sitting in a real classroom. D) Dress shirt or sweater? you may obviously dress as you see fit, but, if I may gently put forward a general advice: resist the temptation of adopting an overly casual dress code during online Zoom classes. E) Lastly, once you've logged in, refrain from turning off your camera: no prof likes to talk to a virtual classroom only populated by anonymous and opaque dark squares. Stay present, stay engaged. Regarding etiquette, the key word is: professional. Adopt a professional and courteous behavior in all your interactions with your peers and with the prof.

8. Email etiquette: Follow proper etiquette when you write an email to your prof. First: always open with a greeting and address the person by his/her proper professional title ("Dear Professor...", "Hello Professor XYZ...", In French, simply write "Bonjour Monsieur XYZ"). Secondly: state your question clearly and concisely. Thirdly: always close politely ("Thank you...", "Best regards", In French: "Cordialement", or "Merci", etc.). And always sign with your full name (not just your first name, or nick name or unsigned anonymous email).
9. Media policy in case of recording: online synchronous courses, assessments and other pedagogical activities delivered in this online course will not be recorded by the instructor; should a need arise to record a class or an activity, participants will be informed in advance and given the opportunity to adjust their technological settings to suit their choice.

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5. Exposé oral / (15%)

Cet exposé oral individuel, par Zoom, devant la classe, pendant les heures de cours, et d'une durée totale de 15 minutes, présentera les premiers résultats de l'analyse d'une question choisie par l'étudiant.e et portant sur une ou plusieurs des œuvres au programme. Quatre séances seront consacrées aux exposés oraux : les cours des 6, 8, 13 et 15 avril 2021. Veuillez noter que les présences en ligne sont obligatoires pour toutes et pour tous pendant ces quatre séances.

6. Dissertation finale / (25%)

Travail de rédaction à faire à la maison et à rendre dans un Dropbox sur D2L mardi le 20 avril 2021.

Academic misconduct

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.



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3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
