DESCRIPTION : L'humanité est éprise des voyages depuis l'Antiquité mais vers la fin du XV^e siècle, le monde occidental assiste à un bouleversement épistémologique. Christoph Colomb découvre l'Amérique en 1492 et Bartolomeo Diaz qui double le cap de Bonne Espérance, ouvre la fameuse *Carreira da India*. C'est alors, pour de nombreux esprits curieux en Europe, l'heure des voyages. Pourtant voyager au XVII^e siècle n'est pas synonyme de tourisme. Alors quelles étaient les raisons qui poussaient ces voyageurs du Grand siècle à voir le monde?

Ce cours propose d'examiner les témoignages des voyageurs français au XVII^e siècle pour en trouver la réponse. Nous comptons aussi retourner le miroir et étudier les extraits de certains voyageurs du Moyen-Orient qui visitent la France durant ce siècle. L'étude de cette littérature se distingue aussi par une diversité d'approches méthodologiques. À cette fin, nous allons explorer les théories de la relation de voyage en lisant Marie-Christine Gomez-Géraud, Roland Le Huenen et Edward Saïd. Nous appliquerons ces connaissances à analyser les extraits des relations de ces aventuriers du Grand siècle.

OBJECTIVES : La lecture de ces relations de voyage et l'étude des ouvrages critiques permettra d'explorer la question de l'identité et de l'altérité. Que comprenons-nous par ces termes et quel est le discours sur l'Autre qui découle de ces témoignages.

OUTCOMES : À la fin du cours, l'étudiant (e) devra être en mesure de :

1. Comprendre les enjeux de la littérature viatique.
2. Connaître les diverses approches méthodologiques pour étudier ce genre.
3. Connaître des relations de voyage françaises qui font figure des « best-sellers » au XVII^e siècle.
4. Analyser et commenter un passage extrait des œuvres au programme.
