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I) Description du cours

Le cours sera une traversé des différentes problématiques et des tendances esthétiques en œuvre dans le roman francophone de l'Afrique subsaharienne, du Maghreb et de la Caraïbe, avec une analyse approfondie des modalités d'écriture caractéristiques des écrivains les plus représentatifs comme Alain Mabanckou, Kossi Efoui, Dany Laferrière, Gisèle Pineau, Calixthe Beyala, Kateb Yacine, Patrick Chamoiseau, Raphaël Confiant, Haddad Malek, Marie-Célie Agnant, etc. Une attention particulière sera accordée à l'évolution, dans le temps et l'espace, des littératures francophones, de leur structure bicéphalique (les écrivains de l'intérieur et les écrivains de l'extérieur), de leur inscription dans les canons de la littérature mondiale et de leur autonomie, de l'adéquation entre le vécu des écrivains et un imaginaire collectif éclaté qui leur sert de matière aussi bien du récit que du projet littéraire. Le cours, à travers des études de romans et d'essais cherchera à confronter les théories de la postmodernité, de la postcolonialité, de la réception, de l'intertextualité, aux différents enjeux esthétiques au centre des préoccupations des écrivains des espaces francophones en question.

- a. Les étudiants sont tenus de lire toutes les œuvres au programme
- b. Celles-ci feront l'objet d'exposés oraux et d'analyse écrites
- c. Les étudiants devront créer une banque de textes relatifs à l'étude des œuvres francophones contemporaines par leurs propres recherches

III) Objectifs généraux

- 1) Approfondir la connaissance des littératures francophones d'Afrique et des Caraïbes aussi bien dans son histoire que dans les différentes tendances qui marquent son évolution
- 2) Maîtriser les interactions entre l'œuvre littéraire et le travail d'écriture qui la porte
- 3) Appliquer les techniques d'analyse littéraire au corpus francophone

A) Objectifs spécifiques

- 1) Avoir une vue analytique sur les œuvres et les figures marquantes de la francophonie littéraire
- 2) Se familiariser aux questions que pose la littérature francophone dans La République mondiale des lettres : celles notamment de Centre et de périphérie, de marge et de marginalité, de l'exil, de la

langue, du flottement identitaire, etc.

- 3) Maîtriser quelques éléments d'approche de la modernité littéraire francophone.

B) Objectifs spécifiques des travaux des étudiants

- 1) Savoir rédiger une étude critique
- 2) Posséder et savoir exploiter un minimum de connaissances en matière de littérature francophone d'Afrique et des Caraïbes.
- 3) Développer le goût de la recherche dans un domaine presque nouveau

Modalités d'évaluation

| 3) Une présentation orale d'une œuvre : | 30% |
| 4) Une dissertation sur un thème relatif au cours | 40% |

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or

laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
