DESCRIPTION This course is designed to expand and refine students' overall linguistic and intercultural competence and corresponds to B2 of the Common European Framework of Reference. Students will increase their overall proficiency and review key grammatical features as well as integrate theory and practice through different class projects.

Prerequisites: German 413 or 415 or consent of the Department

OBJECTIVES Students will:

- explore in depth one advanced communication topic related to the use of German (e.g., nonstandard varieties, register, use of gender-neutral language, relationship between language use and culture) and present their findings in German.
- enhance their metalinguistic awareness and reflect on different language learning strategies.
- practice all 4 language skills (e.g., listening, speaking, reading, and writing) in activities embedded in a rich cultural context.
- expand vocabulary through comprehensible input and class discussions.
- improve pronunciation and comprehensibility through feedback based on individual needs.
- consolidate and extent knowledge of basic grammar structures as well as focus on advanced grammar topics that are only marginally treated in lower-level courses.

OUTCOMES By the end of the course students will be able to interact in German with greater ease and confidence. They will be able to communicate on a wider range of topics, comprehend and summarize more complex texts, present their viewpoints, and engage in analytical discussions.

COURSE NOTES

- All class sessions will be synchronous, via Zoom (The link and passcode will be shared on D2L).
 Students are expected to attend and participate in all synchronous sessions. Participation means
 actively contributing to class sessions. Video connection is not required (as per university policies),
 but students are strongly encouraged to keep their cameras on throughout each session in order to
 maintain a more natural classroom environment and to facilitate interactions and group dynamics.
- During synchronous sessions, students are expected to deactivate background distractions, social media and other programs not in use for the session and to focus attention on the Zoom meeting.
- Synchronous Zoom meetings will not be recorded.
- Detailed course information, including course schedule, assignment instructions, and various learning resources will be posted on D2L. Asynchronous discussions (see *Assessment* below) will also take place on D2L. Therefore, students are expected to visit D2L on a regular basis.
- Assignments must be uploaded to the designated D2L folders (electronic submission of assignments by email will not be accepted unless there are technical issues with D2L).
- Tests will be administered online through D2L. Students will have a 24-hour window to access a given test. Each test will require no more than an hour to be completed, but there will be an additional time extension of 50% of the test duration (e.g., there will be 90 minutes of total time for a 60-minute test) to allow for any technology issues that may arise.
- Students are encouraged not to wait until the last moment to submit assignments, and to contact the course instructor in case of technical issues. Missed tests and late assignments will receive a grade of F.
- Written assignments allow the use of dictionaries, but the use of online translators as well as assistance from others is strictly prohibited. Any suspected violation of this rule will be considered a case of plagiarism and will lead to severe penalties (See notes on academic misconduct below).
- Course evaluations this semester will take place through D2L.

Brief Description of the Assessment Components:

Class participation. Students are expected to come to class prepared and ready to participate. This means they should have completed all assigned readings and/or homework activities before the beginning of class. Each week there will be a different discussion group leader, who will present the main points of the assigned readings and will prepare questions for discussion. All students are expected to contribute to the class discussions.

Asynchronous engagement. Students will contribute to the D2L Discussion forums (i.e., *Grammatik, Wortschatz, Aussprache,* and *Kultur*) on a weekly basis. Each student is expected to ask at least one question and answer at least two peer questions per week in a discussion forum of their choice.

Tests. There will be 3 tests focussed primarily on tracking students' progress in writing and grammar. The use of textbooks and class notes during these tests is strongly discouraged, as it may affect the usefulness of this assessment tool. The use of online translators is prohibited and may lead to penalties.

Multimodal presentation. In the second half of the semester, students will prepare a multimodal presentation (including sound, images, etc.) of the project they are working on. Topics will generally be inspired by the assigned readings and classroom discussions, but other topics students are interested in may also be accepted after consultation with the course instructor. Students may present incomplete (e.g., ongoing) projects, but they need to describe and reflect on the topics they have chosen to explore.

Peer feedback. Students will provide constructive feedback on their peers' projects. This feedback will be formulated based on a number of different criteria and it will be anonymous. Authors will be able to use it in order to complete and/or make improvements to their final projects, if necessary.

Final paper. This will be a written presentation of the students' final projects. They will write an essay or a research article in German related to the topic they will have explored throughout the semester.

More details about each assignment (including due dates, specific expectations, and marking rubrics) will be available in D2L. All assignments will contribute to successfully passing the course.

Academic misconduct

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."



Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
