

# GERMAN 551.38 Adaptations of Grimms' Fairy Tales Winter 2022

**DESCRIPTION** This independent study course focuses on Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm as nineteenth-century collectors and editors of fairy tales whose *Kinder- und Hausmärchen* have often been reinterpreted, rewritten, and transformed by artists as diverse as Walt Disney, German children's book author Cornelia Funke, and (in-)famous heavy metal band Rammstein. Through research, writing, and creative engagement using video or other media, students will have opportunity to explore some of the following topics in depth: historical conditions that led to the Grimms' collection of fairy tales; intertextuality; critical approaches to fairy tales and their adaptations; socio-political contexts of fairy tales; and the enduring yet sometimes complicated legacy of *Märchen* in the twenty-first century.

**OBJECTIVES** This course provides the opportunity to conduct research and develop an independent project that requires finding various sources, articulating a perspective, and choosing an appropriate medium (essay, slide show, or video, for instance). As most readings are in German, moreover, the course also helps strengthen German language skills.

**OUTCOMES** Upon successful completion of the course, students will have gained independent research skills and developed an awareness of fairy tales as a genre and a thorough knowledge of their origins, transmission & dissemination, adaptations, and the critical debates surrounding traditional and modern fairy tales.
