DESCRIPTION

This course offers an examination of XX Century Italian culture and language, as well as a close reading of Natalia Ginzburg's 1963 novel *Lessico famigliare*, a masterpiece of Italian literature. There will be a focus on storytelling, journal and memoirs, family history, History of the XX Century, Italian Fascism and Anti-Fascism, translation studies and creative writing.

OBJECTIVES

Students will be involved in close readings of passages and discussion of the most important chapters and topics of Ginzburg's *Lessico famigliare*, while developing strategies of storytelling and creating fictional narratives, to finally achieve the capacity to tell/write a story in Italian, with an eye on family histories.

Tutorials (W: 16:00-16:50-CHD420) are mandatory, and will enhance writing and conversational skills. "Il Circolino" is also available: students can always go there, and participate in our cultural activities.

OUTCOMES

Students will develop conversational and writing skills, focusing on composition and conversation in Italian, using selected readings from Ginzburg's *Lessico famigliare*, as well as XX Century History resources, literary and cinematic texts. Issues of memory and representation will be the topic of our close readings in class.

A good Italian-English, English-Italian dictionary. A textbook of Italian grammar and syntax.



COURSE NOTES

This course offers an examination of Italian narrative, with a focus on the XX Century, memory, and the different analysis and representations of Fascism and Anti Fascism in Natalia Ginzburg's masterpiece, *Lessico famigliare*. The course will consist in class readings, writing and communicative activities: analyses and seminar discussions will be in Italian. Active participation in class will be expected and encouraged. Screenings of movies devoted to Italy during Fascism, and Italian antifascist resistance, will be organized during the term: attendance is required.

ASSESSMENT

The course will consist in class readings and communicative activities: analyses and seminar discussions will be in Italian. Students' active participation in class will be expected and encouraged.

Attendance, and class participation 20%

Assignments (3 at 5% each) **15%**: throughout the term students will write **3 short essays of 500/600 words each** on selected topics among those covered in class.

Written exams (2 at 15% each) **30%**: they will evaluate students' knowledge of the fundamental aspects of Italian culture and language covered in class, and the ability to analyze selected passages from readings.

Oral presentation 10%: Individual presentation on the same topic and working bibliography chosen for the final paper.

Final paper 25%: 1,750 words double spaced – 7 pages - the final paper will deal extensively with a theme discussed in class. The topic will be agreed with the instructor. The paper will have a length of 7 pages, in Italian.
