#### DESCRIPTION

This course offers an examination of Italian narrative, with a focus on the detective novel, Sicily, Art History and the different analyses and representations of Italy's plots of fiction and reality.

The course will consist in readings, film screenings (*Una storia semplice* by Emidio Greco, 1991, among others), critical analyses, close readings, and discussions; all activities will be in Italian. Active participation from students will be expected and encouraged; attendance is required.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

Students will be involved in close readings of passages and discussion of selections from the detective novels read in class. They will be developing strategies of storytelling and creating fictional narratives, to finally achieve the capacity to tell/write a story in Italian, with a close eye on the detective story's narrative techniques.

### **OUTCOMES**

Students will enhance their writing and conversational skills, as well as develop techniques of critical analysis. "Il Circolino" is available for them to get extra help: tutors can help students review their grammar skills.

#### RECOMMENDED COURSE MATERIALS

A good Italian-English, English-Italian dictionary. A textbook of Italian grammar and syntax.



#### **COURSE NOTES**

This course offers an examination of Italian narrative, with a focus on the Sicily, as represented in Leonardo Sciascia (1921-1989)'s narrative. The course will consist in close readings, enhancing critical thinking and understanding of a rich new vocabulary: analyses and seminar discussions will be in Italian. Active participation in class will be expected and encouraged. Screenings of an adaptation from Leonardo Sciascia's *Una storia semplice*, and other adaptations based on Sicily will be organized during the term: attendance is required.

#### ASSESSMENT

Attendance, and class participation 20%

Assignments (3 at 5% each) 15%

Written exams (2 at 15% each) 30%

Oral presentation 10%

Final paper 25%

Assignments (3 at 5% each) 15%: throughout the term students will write 3 short essays of 500/600 words each on topics of their choice among those covered in class.

**Written exams** (2 at 15% each) 30%: they will evaluate students' knowledge of the fundamental aspects of Italian culture and language covered in class, and the ability to analyze a passage from class readings.

**Oral presentation** 10%: Individual presentation on the same topic chosen for the final paper.

**Final paper** 25%: **2,250 words double spaced (9 pages)** - the paper will deal extensively with a theme discussed in class. The topic will be agreed with the instructor. The paper will be in Italian.
