DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES

This course will examine major works of the Japanese anime and manga presented in their historical, social, and cultural contexts. We will explore variety of animation, genre, anime terms, voice actors, and development of anime studio in relation to Japanese history. Significant numbers of Japanese visual artworks including Ukiyoe, animation, and manga will be introduced in this course. We will exchange views on Japanese major animators such as Tezuka Osamu, Miyazaki Hayao who were influenced by Western animators. Also, we will discuss wide range of Japanese songs, anime songs, dance, and performing arts.

OUTCOMES:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. gain a deeper understanding of manga and anime history, transitions, and genres
- 2. develop a critical analysis of Japanese artworks and its authors
- 3. extend knowledge of Japanese popular culture
- 4. experience how to draw manga and how to sing Japanese songs

Participations

Your participations are evaluated by writing "participation quizzes" on D2L by-weekly. You will write multiple choice or True/False quizzes on what you learned from lectures. **They will be open for a 24hour window during which you will have timed access once you start.**

Assignments

You will submit 5 assignments by due date (see assignment schedule). Your assignments will be evaluated via rubric. Submit the assignments to D2L. The due date for each assignment is one week after the assigned date.

Assignments are from textbook, and you are basically drawing creative anime, except for the assignment #5 (Karaoke). Examples are shown in lectures. Submit all the assignment to the D2L Dropbox and graded via rubric. The lowest grade will be dropped.

Assignment #1: Draw a friend in an anime style and describe it.

Assignment #2: Draw your favorite spots or landmark from 3 different angles and describe it.

Assignment #3: Draw your own anime characters and describe it.

Assignment #4: Draw your own manga page (1 page) and describe it.

Assignment #5: Sing Japanese song with Karaoke recorded and uploaded to the D2L Dropbox.

You will complete 5 online quizzes outside of class hours to test your understanding of lectures. The due date for each quiz is 24 hours after the assigned date. Quizzes will be managed via D2L.
