DESCRIPTION

Japanese 309.02 course will concentrate primarily on historical influences on contemporary Japanese society and its social life. In addition to classroom teaching and individual reading and research, students will have the opportunity to encounter the culture and tradition through the experience of visiting Japan (two weeks). Through the group study in Tokyo, students will trace the development of the city of Edo - Tokyo from the days of the Tokugawa to the present day. This course also contains film viewings.

OBJECTIVES

- Students will gain an overview of Japanese history from the start of the Edo period (1615) to the present day.
- Students will study how present day Tokyo and Japanese culture is a product of its rich historical inheritance and cultural memory. This will include an understanding of how this history remains alive in Tokyo in its present form.
- Students will examine how the historical past is connected to contemporary culture, using movies and fieldwork in Tokyo.
- Students will develop the capacity to examine the city's history independently.

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
