This course is an introduction to theoretical linguistics. The emphasis is on the major areas of phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax and semantics. It also introduces techniques for problem solving and analyzing linguistic data.

Prerequisites: This course is **not** open to students with credit in **Linguistics 205** or **207**.

Students will receive a grade of zero for any piece of work which is not handed in without a valid excuse.

Tests: Tests are based on lecture material and assigned reading. Students are responsible for lecture content despite any class absence. Absence from a test is excused only if valid documentation is provided. If there is a valid reason for missing the midterm its percentage weight will be transferred to the final exam which will then count for 60% of the final grade. There will be no make-up midterm. A deferred final exam can only be granted by the Dean. Assignments/tests may be written in pen or pencil. However, the grade given for an assignment/test written in pencil will not be discussed.

Plagiarism and Academic Misconduct

Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course, when, in fact, it is not. Most commonly plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test),
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author,
- c) the whole work (e.g. an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted. Some course assignments call for students who work in groups. Unless noted otherwise in writing, students must write up their own answers for submission of the assignment. Failure to do so constitutes plagiarism.

Plagiarism is an extremely serious academic offence. Possible penalties for plagiarism include: failing the assignment, failing the course, disciplinary probation, suspension, or expulsion.

Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of plagiarism is also guilty of academic misconduct.

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodations. If you are a student with a documented disability who may require academic accommodation and have not registered with the Disability Resource Centre, please contact their office at 220-8237. Students who have not registered with the Disability Resource Centre are not eligible for formal academic accommodation.
