DESCRIPTION

"Phonology I: Theory and practice of phonological analysis: the classical phoneme; distinctive features and their organisation; methods of analysis; underlying and surface representations; rules and derivations." (Calendar)

OBJECTIVES

This course focuses on understanding how speech sounds are produced, perceived and can be combined to create meaningful language. The primary focus will be on individual speech segments, LING 403 will focus more on larger phonological units and their interactions, such as syllables, prosodic words, and stress patterns.

OUTCOMES

You will learn how to determine if speech sounds are distinctive or not in a particular language, understand some of the ways in which speech segments can interact with each other, and write phonological rules. You will also learn about the anatomical and acoustic properties of different speech sounds, and how they can be represented as phonological features. You will also better understand the difference between phonology and phonetics, and your general problem-solving skills will improve.

COURSE NOTES

ATTENDANCE:

ARTICLE REVIEW:

Students will be required to choose a simple journal article to review that will be due at the end of the semester on **Wednesday December 14**. More details about this review will be provided in a separate handout later in the semester. Students can begin thinking now about a specific language they might be interested in learning more about.

ONLINE OPEN BOOK QUIZZES:

Six online quizzes will be given through D2L during the course, and the top five will be included in the final grade for a total of 5% each. Quizzes will include various types of questions, such as multiple choice, short answer, and true or false. Students will have at least 24 hours to complete each quiz. The material tested by quizzes will be cumulative over the course of the semester. If there are any concerns with completing these quizzes, students are to contact the instructor in order to adjust scheduling.

ASSIGNMENTS:

The bulk of the final grade is based on students' performance on four assignments due over the course of the semester, worth 15% each. Students must write up and submit their assignments independently, however working on the assignments in small groups of 2-4 people is acceptable. Assignments will be provided at least one week before they are due. Students will be able to submit their assignments as a hard copy on paper or digitally through D2L.
