DESCRIPTION

Children start out seemingly unable to communicate through language, but typically end up as fully Competent adult communicators. This course introduces us to the study of how children acquire the sounds, words, and grammar of their native language.

OBJECTIVES

We will explore theoretical issues and approaches regarding language acquisition, including the contributions of the innate endowment of the human mind, as opposed to environmental exposure to language. We will largely focus on typical language development and critically examine empirical evidence and experimental methodologies used to study language development from a wide variety of sources. We will also examine how our theory of acquisition impacts our theory of adult language and vice versa.

OUTCOMES

Students will acquire a good understanding of basic terminology and theoretical concepts and approaches in language development. They will develop the skills necessary to pose theoretically interesting questions and critically examine empirical evidence to answer those.

All assessments contribute to successfully pass the course. Assessment is going to take place online through D2L and is going to be asynchronous. That is, the assessment materials (including exams) will be made available to the students ahead of time and the students will have deadlines by which to submit their responses. Students will be able to work on those on their own time (i.e., over several days or a week) and will not have timed assessments or examinations. Allowed aids include the textbook, lecture slides, and course notes. Due dates for the Midterm and Final exam will be finalized after consultation with the class but are tentatively set as seen above.

GRADING SCALE

Criteria for Letter Grades

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Grading Scale

A+ = 100-97; A = 93-96; A- = 92-88; B+ = 87-83; B = 82-78; B- = 77-73; C+ = 72-68; C = 67-63; C- = 62-58; D+ = 57-53; D = 52-50; F = 49%

To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage (e.g., 89.5% will be rounded up to 90% = A, but 89.4% will be rounded down to 89% = A-).
