#### **Course Description:**

This course provides an introduction to first language acquisition.

#### Goals:

Guasti's textbook has a *cross-linguistic focus*: the goal is to show that children learning different languages in very different social and cultural contexts nonetheless **follow the same developmental trajectory**. Smith's book is a useful "yes, but ..." reminder that although children follow the same developmental trajectories when we look at language acquisition looking at *group data*, there is lots of variation when we compare *individuals*. Both readings and classroom lectures will provide a **linguistic perspective** on language development. One goal is to show how what you learn in your courses on linguistic description (phonology, syntax, semantics) serves as a foundation for understanding language acquisition. A second goal is to provide lots of detail about **stages of development**.

#### **Outcomes:**

On successful completion of this course, these are the **knowledge and skills** that students will have:

- (1) knowledge of the principle components of an explanatory theory of language acquisition;
- (2) knowledge of a simple formal model of language acquisition;
- (3) knowledge of the principle **milestones/stages** in first language acquisition with a clear idea of when the particular **stages** emerge in chronological time or in structural terms, including *Mean Length of Utterance*;
- (4) some understanding of the principle **mechanisms** of language acquisition and how they work;
- (5) some understanding of the main differences between the principal **approaches** (= theoretical paradigms): **functionalist** vs. **special nativistist**;



- (6) good understanding of what child language looks like and sounds like in comparison to the target adult language;
- (7) some understanding of the ways in which language is similar to yet different from other communicative systems that humans use;
- (8) some understanding of the history of the field and important participants, and what critical ideas they have contributed.

**PLAGIARISM** is a serious offense, the penalty for which is an 'F' on the assignment and possibly also an 'F' in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw.

The University Calendar states that "plagiarism" exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.
- While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."
- Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
- 2. Cheating at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.



- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.
