**DESCRIPTION:** This course is an introduction to linguistic typology, the comparative study of the grammatical properties of the languages of the world within the domains of syntax and morphology. Typologists try to discover the ways in which languages differ from each other, what the range of variation is, which grammatical properties are common, and which are rare, and what properties (if any) are shared by all languages. It presents an overview of some of the main results of typological research and compares typological and generative approaches to cross-linguistic variation and universals.

**OBJECTIVES:** The goals of LING 455 are to introduce grammatical phenomena that differ from those of English, and to familiarize students with analytical techniques and results of typological and generative approaches to cross-linguistic variation and universals.

**OUTCOMES:** Students will gain experience in conducting morphological and syntactic analyses of different types of languages. They will learn how to apply concepts and tools introduced in class and in course readings, and how to use primary sources, notably descriptive grammars, to develop an in-depth typological profile of a specific language.
