DESCRIPTION: A continuation of Spanish 201, this is a beginning level course primarily for students with prior knowledge of the language (one semester of university level Spanish or Spanish 30). This course is structured on the communicative approach to language learning and strong emphasis is placed on basic skills, namely: listening, speaking, reading, writing and cultural awareness.

Prerequisites

Spanish 30, Spanish 201 or equivalent.

The University of Calgary has a system for Spanish language course placement. Students who pursued an IB program or the bilingual (English-Spanish) program in Alberta High Schools should take the placement test. Information about course placement can be found at:

OBJECTIVES: This course, measured as an integrated performance in speaking, listening, reading and writing is intended to familiarize you with the structure of the Spanish language, and expose you to different Hispanic cultures, increasing your awareness of the Spanish-speaking world.

OUTCOMES

Listening

You will be able to more completely understand the content of audio and video material that accompanies the textbook. Recognize and understand expressions from authentic media.

Speaking

Develop communicative abilities to function in simple survival situations, such as placing phone calls, ordering a meal, making travel arrangements, renting an apartment, explaining medical problems... Able to ask pertinent information questions.

Reading

Able to understand the main ideas of selected authentic material, (simple comic strips, ads, travel timetable, menus, periodical/web materials) to further develop reading skills as well as a more in-depth comprehension about the topics. The student will be able to grasp the meaning of simple prose/verse, through various reading strategies such as skimming, identifying main ideas, using the dictionary.

Writing

Begin to create structured written material (in paragraphs) to describe and narrate past events grounded in personal experience, and express opinions, hopes and desires for the immediate future. Able to apply useful writing strategies such as the pastiche, organizing ideas in chronological order, avoiding redundancy.

Culture

Increase knowledge of significant differences between the varied and rich Hispanic culture and the learner's native culture, in behavior, attitudes and other aspects. Develop an awareness of language as an essential element of culture.

Tests

Course evaluations will be conducted in person in the classroom. Test 1 will take place on **February 16**th. Test 2 will take place **on March 30**th. Additional instructions on exams will be posted on D2L.

Exam 1

This assessment will be a take-home exam posted on D2L at the beginning of class on February 16th at 2:00 p.m. and will be due via quizzes on D2L on February 17th at 2:00 p.m. (for 24 hours). You will have 100 minutes to complete and submit it. The take-home exam will consist of questions on vocabulary, grammatical structures, and readings.

Classes will take place in CHD 420 & CHD 428 on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Given the shortage of classrooms at peak times and the risk of contagion from Covid-19, the class will be split in half. Half of the class will be in CHD 420, and the other half in the adjacent Language Lab (CHD 428). The class will be structured so that on alternate days, one half of the class will attend the professor's lecture, and the other half will do exercises under the TA's supervision. Zoom links will be posted on D2L.

Class etiquette

- It is required that students purchase the e-book or the paper copy of the textbook and bring it to class.
- Classes will be taught in Spanish.
- Students should conduct themselves appropriately during class sessions.
- Study the vocabulary, the grammatical structures, and the sections for the corresponding class in advance. Details
 can be found on the calendar.
- Do the exercises on the Spanish Hub before each class.
- While working in CHD 428, students may be able to use their own laptops or the lab computers.

Class etiquette for Zoom sessions

- Classes will be taught in Spanish.
- Students should conduct themselves appropriately during Zoom class sessions.
- Students are expected to use both a microphone and their camera to interact with the professor and other students in class.
- Please mute yourself when you are not talking, in order to reduce background noise.
- If you are joining the Zoom session from a room that has other people in it, use headphones when possible.



- Leave your pets out of the room when you are attending a room session.
- During class, please only use technology as is relevant to class. Do not use technology for purposes not relevant to class (e.g., checking email and social media). Do not do other work for other classes during our Zoom sessions.

The official grading system (A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1) will be applied for the calculation of the final mark.

2 TESTS – 20% + 25%. (50 minutes each). Each Test will be based on the following:

Test I: Chapters 6 & 7 February 16th.

Test II: Chapters 8 & the first part of Chapter 9 (Tú commands). March 30th.

The week before each Test the instructor will post the format of the test on D2L. The instructor will explain to the students each section, and the marking criteria. There will be questions on vocabulary, grammatical structures, and readings. The Tests can also include review questions from the previous chapters. No books, notes or dictionaries are allowed. Each Test is divided into several sections and may include, grammar questions, vocabulary questions, reading comprehension.



Projects 2x10=20% (In Class).

The projects are based on topics given in the textbook and adjusted to the Canadian experience. Students will find specific instructions posted on D2L.

First project: For topic, access D2L for specific instructions. Second project: For topic, access D2L for specific instructions.

The grade assigned will take into consideration:

- > Projects are marked out of 100 points.
- > 50 points are for content (respect of the given topic, appropriate length, no repetitions, organization of the sentences and paragraphs, creativity)
- > 50 points are for proper language use (spelling, grammatical structures, use of the vocabulary seen in class, punctuation and general presentation regarding margins and neatness).
- Check the course schedule for specific dates for the projects. Failure to submit the project on the due date will result in an F unless the student has a compelling reason to fail to submit the assignment. The student should contact the instructor as soon as possible, providing information about the reason for the inability to submit the project at the scheduled time, and providing the student's availability to complete the project at a time as close as possible to the originally scheduled time or transfer the percentage to the next assignment.
- > The student can attend one of the four key activities that will be carried out at the Spanish Centre, write a 200-word report, and post it on D2L instead of submitting one of the projects. A corrected version of the students' reports will be posted on the Spanish Centre D2L. The student should contact the instructor by email three days in advance of the due date for the project, to let him/her know that he/she will do the activity at the Spanish Centre.

Oral Presentation - 15%

This activity will be based on a list of topics the instructor will post on D2L or on any other topic of interest for the students. Your instructor will approve your activity beforehand. This activity will be done in groups of two or three students. Each student will be evaluated individually. The presentation will be from 15 to 20 minutes depending on the number of students in each group. No scripts will be allowed. The purpose of this activity is to encourage students to speak freely in Spanish. No reading is allowed. Only index cards with main points are permitted. Marking rubrics: Content, grammar, pronunciation, varied vocabulary (25% each) a penalty of -10 points will be in effect if the presentation is read. This activity will take place during the last weeks of classes starting on **February 26**th. Please choose the group, date, and topic of your presentation by **February 18**th.

Class attendance and participation- 10%:

To derive the utmost benefit from instruction, daily attendance is essential. Lack of attendance may adversely affect your overall performance and may have a negative impact on your final grade. The final grade calculation considers your attendance and active, positive contribution to classes. The grade for attendance and participation will be assessed as follows:

A (Excellent)

Preparation: Always well-prepared.*

<u>Participation</u>: attentive** and always volunteers; always tries to use Spanish with classmates and instructor; makes the most of each activity or exercise; shows real resourcefulness and imagination when using the language; responds to and engages classmates in a respectful manner; remains critical and open-minded toward target and native culture.

B (Very good)

Preparation: Usually well prepared.

Participation: attentive and frequently volunteers; almost always tries to use Spanish with classmates and instructor; makes the most of each activity or exercise; completes activities and exercises with some imagination and resourcefulness; makes some effort to

C (Good)

Preparation: Adequately prepared.

Participation: Attentive and occasionally volunteers; sometimes needs to be reminded to use Spanish with instructor and classmates; responds and completes exercises with minimal imagination; does not engage classmates beyond the minimum requirements for an assignment.

D (Fair)

Preparation: Usually unprepared.

<u>Participation</u>: Makes little effort to participate or complete exercises; rarely tries to use Spanish with the instructor or classmates.

F (Poor)

Preparation: Always unprepared.
