### DESCRIPTION

This intensive low-intermediate Spanish course has been specially designed to allow students with previous knowledge of Spanish to fast-track their learning of the language.

Its aim is to ensure students develop sufficient linguistic ability to understand and respond appropriately to the most common situations of everyday life, to begin to express themselves in familiar contexts, to describe experiences and events, wishes and needs in a basic way, and to give short explanations for opinions and plans. This course will follow the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, at the A2-B1 levels.

Students are encouraged to take the DELE (Diploma de Español Lengua Extranjera) Examination at the A2 level, which will be offered on November 23<sup>th</sup>, at the University of Calgary. ## Objectives

Listening: Be able to do the following:

- Understand a growing number of phrases and expressions related to areas of personal relevance (e. g. basic personal and family information, instructions to get to a certain location, information about food, shopping, employment)
- Understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc.
- Identify the main topic of a conversation between native speakers if they speak clearly.
- Catch the main point in short, clear announcements and the main ideas of radio or TV programmes on current affairs or topics of personal or professional interest when the delivery is relatively slow and clear.

Reading: Be able to do the following:

- Skim short texts (for example news summaries) and find relevant facts and information.
- Understand the most important information in short simple everyday information brochures dealing with leisure activities, exhibitions, as well as on small advertisements dealing with apartments for rent, cars, etc.
- Understand simple instructions.
- Identify the important information in newspaper articles in which numbers or graphics play an important role.
- Understand the plot of a clearly structured story and recognise what the most important episodes and events are and what is significant about them.
- Understand, in private letters, those parts dealing with events, feelings and wishes.

Spoken production and interaction: Be able to do the following:

- Start, maintain and close a simple face-to-face conversation on topics that are familiar or of personal interest (about one's family, friends, work, studies, leisure interests). Some difficulty in expressing oneself clearly may be encountered.
- Perform simple tasks that involve the exchange of information (ask for and follow directions, make plans, ask for information about an apartment, give instructions and react when instructions are given, maintain a conversation with a waiter)
- Explain and give reasons for plans and intentions. Propose an activity, give advice, ask permission.
- Narrate experiences, describing feelings and reactions such as admiration, surprise, interest.

- Narrate a story in a simple fashion.
- Paraphrase a written story orally using the same wording and ordering.
- Give or seek personal views and opinions in an informal discussion with friends.
- Agree and disagree politely.

Writing: Be able to do the following:

- Write simple connected texts on a range of familiar topics.
- Reply in written form to advertisements and ask for more complete or more specific information.
- Write personal letters asking and giving news, narrating events, giving opinions and expressing feelings such as grief, happiness, interest, regret and sympathy.
- Narrate the plot of a film or a book or give an account of a concert in a simple fashion.
- Use basic sentence patterns and simple structures correctly even if basic mistakes are still made.
- Link phrases using simple connectors (such as también, por eso, sin embargo, cuando, hasta).

#### Culture

Increase knowledge of significant differences between the varied and rich Hispanic cultures and the learner's native culture, in behaviour, attitudes and other aspects. Develop an awareness of language as an essential element of culture.

### Prerequisites

Spanish 30, Spanish 201 or equivalent.

## **COURSE NOTES**

The calendar for this class posted on Blackboard is not binding and can change according to the needs of the class.

To derive the utmost benefit from instruction, daily attendance is essential. Class participation is a necessary component of this course. Lack of attendance may adversely affect your overall performance and may have a negative impact on your final grade. Besides, failure to attend class and tutorial always results in missed opportunities to hear and speak Spanish.

Your audio and oral abilities could also be enhanced by engaging in conversation with Spanish speaking tutors at the Centro de Tertulia (*Spanish Centre*) located in Craigie Hall D303.

Students will be encouraged to communicate consistently in the target language from the start of the course.

Depending on their abilities, students are expected to spend a minimum of two hours in outside preparation for each class period.

The last day to drop this course is September 20<sup>th</sup>.

- Late assignments and missed tests policy :

5% of the grade will be deducted for each day a written assignment (activity or composition) is late if there is no Physician/Counselor statement to justify the absence or the failure to complete it. Attendance for all exams is compulsory. A student who is absent from a test for legitimate reasons must discuss an alternative course of action with the instructor within a week. The instructor may request a Physician/ Counselor statement for the date detection of the reasons.

Do not make travel arrangements for the dates when exams are scheduled. Missed tests, assignments and examinations with no legitimate reason will be given a grade of F.

- Electronic submission of assignments:

A hard copy of the assignments should be submitted at the beginning of the class.

# ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);

b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;

c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or

d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
