

# SPAN 323 INTRODUCTION TO TEXTUAL ANALYSIS & COMPOSITION Winter 2018

#### **COURSE OUTLINE**

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### DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to develop writing skills in Spanish through textual analysis and composition. The texts will be taken from various sources centered on the themes of the UNESCO 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The course involves activities designed to develop reading skills and strategies and nurture writing abilities using approaches that students will be able to integrate into their own styles. The student is expected to write different types of compositions in Spanish. In addition, students will also review Spanish grammar, syntax and vocabulary while critically reviewing peer work.

# **OBJECTIVES**

This course, while focusing on reading and writing, is intended to familiarize you with the structure of the Spanish language, and expose you to different Hispanic cultures and issues affecting the Spanish-speaking world. Throughout the course you will be required to integrate speaking, listening, reading and writing skills in a collaborative learning environment.

# **OUTCOMES**

On successful completion of the course, the students will have demonstrated:

- An ability to write original texts in Spanish for various audiences and in various formats
- Active knowledge in evaluating texts in Spanish for grammatical structure and content
- Developed skills to constructively work in editorial teams developing texts for future use
- An expanding awareness of the challenges facing the world in the 21st century through the lens of the 17 sustainable development goals outlined by UNESCO

# Written Assignments. 5%, 8%, 10%, 12% = 35%

The grade assigned will take into consideration:

- Ideas and organization (use of linking words, fluidity...)
- · Variety and correct use of the grammatical structures learned during the course
- Variety and correct use of the vocabulary learned during the course, spelling, accents, and punctuation.
- Correct use of MLA citations, references, and general presentation format regarding margins, font, and organization.

### Collaborative Activities. 2%, 3%, 4%, 5% = 14%

The grade assigned for these grouped activities will take into consideration:

- Contribution to the improvement of written assignments.
- Extraction of key topics and creation of complimentary comprehension questions.
- Expansion of materials into spheres of future discussion and consideration.
- Fair and equitable contribution to group activities.
- Considerate and respectful attitude towards peers.

# In-class Presentations. 3%, 10% = 13%

The first presentation will be in the PechaKucha format and grade will be assigned on completeness, conciseness, and adherence to the presentation topic and format requirements.

The second presentation grade will take into consideration both the presentation and moderation of a discussion post presentation.

### Final Written Assignment. 25%

The grade assigned will take into consideration:

- Adherence to research paper format including: introduction, thesis statement, organizational structure, and conclusion.
- Appropriate use of language: grammatical structures, spelling, accents, and punctuation.
- Judicious and appropriate use of references: appropriate selection of peer-reviewed journal and book sources, correct use of MLA citations and references, and general presentation format.



# Class attendance and participation. 13%

To derive the utmost benefit from the course, daily attendance is essential. Lack of attendance will adversely affect your overall performance and will have a negative impact on your final grade. The final grade calculation considers your attendance and active, positive contribution to classes, and constructive collaboration with your peers. The grade for attendance and participation will be assessed as follows:

# A (Excellent)

Preparation: Always well prepared.\*

Participation: Attentive\*\* and always volunteers; always uses Spanish with classmates and instructor; makes the most of each activity or exercise; shows real resourcefulness and imagination when using the language; responds to and engages classmates in a respectful manner; remains critical and open-minded toward target and native culture.

# B (Very good)

Preparation: Usually well prepared.

Participation: Attentive and frequently volunteers; almost always tries to use Spanish with classmates and instructor; makes the most of each activity or exercise; completes activities and exercises with some imagination and resourcefulness; makes some effort to engage fellow; shows some development of cultural sensitivity.

### C (Good)

Preparation: Adequately prepared.

Participation: Attentive and occasionally volunteers; sometimes needs to be reminded to use Spanish with instructor and classmates; responds and completes exercises with minimal imagination; does not engage classmates beyond the minimum requirements for an assignment.

# D (Fair)

Preparation: Usually unprepared.

Participation: Makes little effort to participate or complete exercises; rarely tries to use Spanish with the instructor or classmates.

#### F (Poor)

Preparation: Always unprepared.

Participation: Makes no contribution to the class whatsoever.

- \*Well prepared = vou completed all vour homework
- \*\* Focus on the class. Arriving late, having outside conversations, leaving the room, gathering materials before class is finished, showing a lack of common courtesy.

### ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- 1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:
- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.



- 2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.
- 3. Other academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures
- 4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
