DESCRIPTION

Este curso ofrece un acercamiento a la ficción y ensayística hispánica desde el principio de libertad creativa con base en la idea de diálogo (J. Ortega). Así, las narrativas y autoras/es estudiadas/os serán articulados en procesos sociales e históricos siguiendo un mapa de autoras/es y textos. Este mapa geohistórico buscará entablar un diálogo narrativo temporal y espacial sobre la formación nacional, la alteridad y pluralidad identitarias, las ideas de modernidad y otros temas, desde una perspectiva crítica y analítica.

OBJECTIVES

Identificar temas y características frecuentes en la narrativa hispanoamericana; ampliar el conocimiento sobre historia y sociedad latinoamericanas, mejorar la habilidad de escritura analítica, habla y lectura en español; introducir herramientas básicas del análisis y la crítica literarios.

OUTCOMES

Aprender a hablar y a escribir sobre narrativa, no pensando en articulaciones por épocas, movimientos, o ideas de evolución, sino en término del diálogo entre autoras/es y temporalidades sobre temas comunes de la historiografía literaria y en base a criterios específicos de análisis.

COURSE NOTES

The information on the course schedule posted on D2L is not binding and can change according to the needs of the class.

Los dos ensayos (800 palabras cada uno) consistirán en el análisis de textos literarios. El trabajo final será un trabajo de investigación sobre un texto literario y se escribirá conforme a las normas vigentes bibliográficas. Ya que se requiere investigación para el trabajo final, el/la estudiante consultará fuentes secundarias de índole académica (un mínimo de 5), las citará correctamente y evaluará su contenido a la vez que formulará su propia lectura de la obra literaria en cuestión. En todos casos, los estudiantes recibirán dos notas de peso igual: una que corresponderá al análisis, la argumentación y el pensamiento, y otra que corresponderá a la exactitud gramática y el uso adecuado del vocabulario.

Exámenes parciales: abarcarán los contenidos vistos hasta el momento del parcial. Cada examen consistirá en responder a tres preguntas de desarrollo relacionadas con los autores y las obras estudiadas en clase y evaluará:

- Dominio y aplicación de los contenidos (30 puntos)
- Ideas personales razonadas a partir de los contenidos (30 puntos)
- Estructura y coherencia de la exposición (20 puntos)
- Empleo del lenguaje específico (vocabulario) (10 punto)
- Ortografía y redacción (10 puntos)

La participación es imprescindible en este curso, puesto que el debate y el trabajo en grupos pequeños forman parte importante de la metodología pedagógica del curso. Las/os estudiantes deberán participar en la construcción del conocimiento que busca impartir el curso. Por un lado, deberán participar activamente en los debates y análisis planteados en clase sobre los textos; por otro, deberán leer las lecturas asignadas en el programa y realizar los ejercicios de comprensión colgados en D2L.

Será necesario completar todos los trabajos del curso para aprobarlo. Las fechas de todas las actividades aparecen en el calendario del curso, en D2L. Allí mismo encontrarán otros recursos que deberán ser preparados y estudiados semanalmente para la discusión en clase. Como complemento pedagógico de la asignatura, se emplearán materiales audiovisuales, fotografías, bibliografía y páginas Web ofrecidos por la profesora.

Los mensajes electrónicos serán respondidos entre 24 y 48 horas. It is best if you ask **questions** about **any assignment** during office hours or by appointment as that will give me a better chance to address more clearly any issue or question you may have.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

1. **Plagiarism** is a serious offence, the penalty for which is an F on the assignment and possibly also an F in the course, academic probation, or requirement to withdraw. Plagiarism exists when:

- a) the work submitted or presented was done, in whole or in part, by an individual other than the one submitting or presenting the work (this includes having another impersonate the student or otherwise substituting the work of another for one's own in an examination or test);
- b) parts of the work are taken from another source without reference to the original author;
- c) the whole work (e.g., an essay) is copied from another source, and/or
- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted."

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.

2. **Cheating** at tests or examinations includes but is not limited to dishonest or attempted dishonest conduct such as speaking to other candidates or communicating with them under any circumstances whatsoever; bringing into the examination room any textbook, notebook, memorandum, other written material or mechanical or electronic device not authorized by the examiner; writing an examination or part of it, or consulting any person or materials outside the confines of the examination room without permission to do so, or leaving answer papers exposed to view, or persistent attempts to read other students' examination papers.

3. **Other academic misconduct** includes, but is not limited to, tampering or attempts to tamper with examination scripts, class work, grades and/or class records; failure to abide by directions by an instructor regarding the individuality of work handed in; the acquisition, attempted acquisition, possession, and/or distribution of examination materials or information not authorized by the instructor; the impersonation of another student in an examination or other class assignment; the falsification or fabrication of clinical or laboratory reports; the non-authorized tape recording of lectures.

4. Any student who voluntarily and consciously aids another student in the commission of one of these offences is also guilty of academic misconduct.
