DESCRIPTION

Welcome to Span 437! The analysis and interpretation of shorter fictional forms in Spain and Latin America, from basic narrative techniques to the broad range of critical approaches to literary works. Strong emphasis will be placed on the understanding of the Hispanic cultures through literature and the development of critical thinking. This course introduces students to Spain and Latin-American's cultural complexity through readings of works by author's representative of its diverse linguistic and literary traditions. Topics may include community empowerment; gender; nation, ethnicity and identity.

OBJECTIVES

- Develop and practice Critical Thinking trough literature.
- The short stories engage the student in critical dialogue with the author, language, characters, etc.
 It's an active process, where the reader responds, questions, interprets, synthesizes, evaluates and analyzes the text.
- Enhance their comprehension of the Hispanic world and its cultures.
- Review and practice grammatical structures from the Intermediate level courses
- Learn and practice more advanced grammatical structures
- Learn and develop reading strategies that are appropriated for literary texts.
- Analyze the most representative works and movements in relation to their cultural, political and historical contexts.

OUTCOMES

- Produce clear, detailed text on a wide range of subjects and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options-(CEFR) B2
- Learn to develop research questions and conduct original research.
- Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of key developments in Latin American societies and cultures.
- Gain an appreciation for how literature reflects and sometimes resists and confronts cultural, institutional, social, and religious norms.
