COURSE NOTES

- 1. The information on the course outline handed with this Course Information Sheet and posted on Blackboard is not binding and can change according to the needs of the class.
- 2. Films are to be seen during the tutorials. It is recommended that you take notes. Some films may contain strong language and sex scenes.
- 3. The Cuaderno de Análisis must examine one of the films of this course.
- 4. The Blackboard Forum will contain questions about the films and about the theory and terminology studied.
- 5. The final essay must study a Mexican film (if you do not know the origin of the film, go to www.imdb.com or ask the professor).
- 6. Many of the texts for this course will be in English.
- 7. 5% of the grade will be deducted for each day any written assignment is late if there is no written document to justify the absence or the failure to complete it.
- 8. No makeup tests will be given. Instead the percentage assigned to a specific test will be added to the next test the student has to take.
- 9. To derive the utmost benefit from instruction, daily attendance is essential. Lack of attendance may adversely affect your overall performance and may have a negative impact on your final grade.

- d) a student submits or presents work in one course which has also been submitted in another course (although it may be completely original with that student) without the knowledge of or prior agreement of the instructor involved.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted." Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged. A bibliography is insufficient to establish which portions of the student's work are taken from external sources; footnotes or other recognized forms of citation must be used for this purpose.
